
Sittingbourne Baptist Church December Magazine & Diary 2019



This year we are giving out Advent Calendars, with effect from November 29th and we have a good number of donations of the Real Advent Calendar from within the church and we like these because of the Christian booklet enclosed. We will hand out gift bags with effect from December 6th as clients come to us, one per family or individual.

In the bags we are putting individual Christmas puddings, shortbread or boxes of biscuits, selection boxes, jelly, snack type party food, crisps or Pringles, and a Christmas card.

Perishable food is not included, for obvious reasons; we are trying to think what can we do to make Christmas special for those with so little money or choices. Donations will always be welcomed for the gifts from Sittingbourne Baptist Church and also the Reverse Advent boxes which are collected Nationally for

Foodbank users at this time of year.

(Editor's note— Reverse Advent is putting something into a box every day for the duration of Advent and then passing the contents on to the Foodbank Volunteers who are distributing them across the area on Christmas Eve.)

Swale Foodbank are also taking part in additional and special Christmas collections at Morrisons and Sainsbury's in December. We are hoping to have special items as well as the usual fare. At the moment we are short of meat, pasta sauces, tinned fruit, custard and rice pudding, squash and juice, but at the moment do not need pasta and baked beans. All the food bank outlets seem to have surplus of these. For those who could possibly volunteer:-Phoenix House, Central Avenue is hosting Companionship at Christmas meals on Christmas Day and Boxing Day. There will be hot and cold food and there is no charge. Transport is available on request. Booking is essential. Contact Julia Watling or Louise Johnson on 01795 473828. Volunteers to help are welcome or if you know someone who needs the time of friendship then let them know about the two days of meals.
